Let Your Faith in Christ Shine Forth



"No one lights a lamp and hides it or puts it under a basket. Instead, everyone who lights a lamp puts it on a lamp stand so that those who come in will see its light" (Luke 11:33, GWTN).

When you light a candle, what will you do with it? Perhaps put it in a secret place or under a bushel basket? "No, no," you will say, "I will put it on a candlestick, so that all who come in may see the light." Right you are! Now God has made you to be a light in this world by giving you faith in the crucified and risen Lord Jesus. Surely He does not want you to hide this faith. Joseph of Arimathaea did this. He was a disciple of Jesus; but he kept it a secret for fear of the Jews. He hid his faith as Christians so often do. They are afraid to confess Jesus as their Savior, afraid that people will laugh and mock.

Why do you think that Jesus gives us faith? First, He did it to save us; but He also did it so we would let our light, our faith, shine before men, confess Him before all the world, walk as children of light, show the world the precious Savior, in whom we believe. No more afraid, he boldly went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus, then took it down from the Cross, and before all people confessed: "This is my Lord and Savior." For this reason God by His Holy Spirit also worked faith in our hearts. He wants us to let our faith shine forth and by that bring other sinners to the Cross and everlasting life.



Last year (2013) Rev. Schumacher received a call from the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod International Missions to serve as Career

Missionary to Ghana, West Africa. After much prayer and consideration he accepted the call and will be deploying the end of August or beginning of September this year for five years or more. He will be teaching at the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ghana's (ELCG) new seminary in Accra and assisting the ELCG with Deaf Ministry. His wife, Cindy, will be working with four Lutheran schools in Accra, serving as a mentor for teachers and assisting with administration.

Mission Trip to Macau, China by Jennifer Ceyanes



I have a wonderful opportunity to serve in Macau, China! I am going back this October for three to four weeks. I will be working with the deaf school, deaf center, and the deaf church. I will see many of the

deaf children and adults who I worked with 14 years ago when I served as a volunteer missionary.

In the fall of 1998, I went to Macau to serve as the first deaf volunteer missionary for LCMS World Mission. I worked with the deaf children and teachers at the deaf school there. I was there for a year and half before leaving in early 2000. It broke my heart to leave and I am excited to be returning this fall!

Pastor Thomas Dunseth was the career missionary in Macau at the time I was there. He left Macau shortly after I did and is currently the pastor for the deaf in Michigan. He still goes to Macau several times a year. I will be meeting him there this October and doing Bible studies, workshops, and possibly a retreat. There is much work for me to do!

The cost of this trip will be around \$2,500. This will cover the costs of airfare, lodging, and food. From the Pastoral Advisor



Greetings to all of you from rainy Vancouver, BC! As pastoral advisor, I must admit that I have difficulty to create a bright idea for writing an article for Deaf Lutheran newsletter this spring. Since I

read and perused The Canadian Lutheran newsletter monthly, I have been trying to locate a deaf-friendly article, but it does not make sense to me to spread God's words to any deaf, hardof-hearing, or hearing Lutheran Christians.

However, I decided to write an interesting article on viewing the Biblical films since I saw all of the closed-captioned or subtitled movies from last September to present. As a reviewer, I love writing a movie report after I watched each film monthly, so I am going to share my review with you, subscribers. As of the first Biblical Movie Night on September 2013, "The Bible: In The Beginning" was a real masterpiece and I liked the way the film was produced lovely pictures that the first seven days God created the Earth.

The second Biblical Movie Night on October 2013 called "Jacob" was dealt with a story of love for a beautiful woman named Rachel, for a bitter brother named Esau, and for a God whom Jacob wrestled with. The key story was that Jacob became the father of twelve tribes of Israel. That movie was very good biblically and historically. The third Biblical Movie on November 2013 called Joseph was one of my most favourite biblical movies because it was very beautiful and well-versed that Joseph declared. Joseph used his gift for dreaming and sharing God's views with Pharaoh. Joseph's verses were powerful to me as he said, "Forgiveness is greater than vengeance." and "Compassion is more powerful than anger" since his ten brothers dumped Joseph down the well. But can he forgive so grievous a wrong? As for the next great movie called "Moses", we found that movie full of entertainment as Moses divided the river into two high walls of water that the Israelis walked through with awe.

The fourth biblical hero movie, "Samson and Delilah" was quite remarkable historically and this movie told a story of faith and deception. Samson terrorized his peoples' oppressors like the Philistines until Delilah was very attractive who enthralled Samson as she know Samson's secret that weakened him.

The next fifth biblical hero movie called "The Story of Ruth" was awesome for our learning. Being a Moabite, Ruth was very helpful to the Israelis for being faithful to God only since she escaped from the Moab pagan rite for the female children who sacrificed their lives for the idols.

As of the sixth movie, "David" on January, 2014, we found this story full of historical attractions and I liked the way the producer made different scenes David played through from the beginning to the end.

The seventh movie called "Solomon" was equally wonderful as the first temple was built by the brilliant Jew masons and artistic sculptors but Solomon was horrible himself as he married over six hundred wives against God's will.

The final movie named "Jeremiah" was brilliantly produced as the ancient Babylonians invaded Jerusalem very easily, captured the wicked Jewish king and his sons, and killed the sons and blinded the king in Babylon when King Nebuchadnezzar confronted and commanded his executioners to do their job. However, with interest, that cruel king requested that Jeremiah be released from an Israeli prison since the Jews persecuted and branded Jeremiah as a traitor as a warning others of the destruction of Jerusalem and he stubbornly continued with his mission.
