Luke 1: 39-45

An old car was seen with a special license plate in a part of town with expensive homes. The plate read **42UNATE**, which mean "fortunate". I wonder why the owner chose that word. All the other cars in that neighborhood were expensive cars. Maybe the owner wanted to say that he was happy with whatever he had.

That word "fortunate" means receiving some unexpected good thing, as when a car skids out of control on an icy road without any damage to the car of driver. Fortunate is a word that can be used by a family experiencing hard times at Christmas, but an anonymous person sends a check for \$1,000 to help them out. Fortunate is a word that every child of God can use to describe their state as a recipient of God's gifts of body and spirit, even though totally undeserving of anything good from HIM.

In the text Elizabeth certainly feels fortunate. When her relative, Mary, visits her, she says, "Why are you coming to me?" Her question shows that she feels unworthy in having the mother of her Lord visit at her house. It shows her faith in knowing the baby inside Mary is her Savior by using the word, Lord! Elizabeth felt very fortunate to be in the presence of the Lord and she knew it.

Of course, Mary was fortunate also. She was chosen from among all the women ever living in the past and those that would live in the future to be the mother of Jesus. And Mary realizes this

and begins her song to show it. Mary's song is a song of humility. This is a good reminder for you and me that our Advent and Christmas is best begun and filled with an honest recognition of our sinfulness and unworthiness. I am sure that you don't need to think very much to notice the sin in your life and that should send you to your knees in humility before the manager of the Lord and Savior. We are indeed fortunate to have a God that loves us so much that HE willingly sent HIS Son to take our place and to suffer and die in order that we might be forgiven and live with HIM in heaven.

42UNATE - "fortunate" should be on every Christians car or bicycle so that we can proclaim to the world as we live in obedience to God and with our acts of service to others, and lives rich with mercy, lives that show the good fortune we have received because of Jesus.







1997 Convocation on Deaf Ministry

Savior Pastoral Center Kansas City October 3-5, 1997

Approximately 100 people attended the Convocation. They include deaf lay people, professional workers in deaf ministry, interpreters, parents of deaf children, social workers, educators and synodical/district executives.

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The theme for Kansas City's convocation was "Vision beyond 2000: Looking into the future with Jesus."

Worships, speakers, questions & comments, group sessions and evening devotions were on the agenda at Kansas City.

Dr. Mark Prowatzke gave the Keynote Address. Don Peterson spoke about "Changes in the deaf

world since 1981." Dr. Rodney Rynearson spoke about "Changes in deaf ministry since 1981." Alice Hagemeyer's topic was "Anticipated changes in the deaf world." and Dr. Rodney Rynearson's speech was: Anticipated changes in deaf ministry."

After two group sessions and ballots, the three goals for deaf ministry for the next 16 years are: 1) *Encourage support for Deaf Institute of Theology (DIT) program*;

2) Unchurched deaf people are important to God, therefore, all pastors become missionaries focusing 1/3 of their time in outreach and another 1/3 of his time to train members in outreach,

attitudes and actions; and

3) More emphasis on outreach of deaf children/teens, through modern technology, more involvement in church services and church activities.

The third group session discusses what do we need to do to reach these three new goals.



I felt it would be interesting to reprint it for you *Deaf Lutherans* readers to read about it. For your information, there are 55 Deaf churches in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod in the USA.

Emmanual Lutheran Church of the Deaf

Emmanuel Lutheran Church of the Deaf has been an organized congregation since 1898. It is the oldest deaf church in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod, and one of the oldest in the United States. Emmanuel is one of three deaf church in South Wisconsin District and is also a member of the Central Region Conference of the ILDA. We have several worship sites in our 92 year history. Our church moved to its third location in May 1987 and continues to serve the Deaf in the Greater Milwaukee area. We are now located at 2306 South 98th Street, West Allis, Wisconsin, 53227.


Currently worship is every Sunday at 9:45 am with Bible Study at 9:00 am. We provide Adult and Youth Confirmation Classes. We have Sunday School with

about 12 children attending, 4 of them are deaf. We have a men's club and a Ladies Aid group. These organizations help support the church through various fund raising activities and also assist in spreading the Good news about Jesus. We have a banner committee which makes beautiful banners to praise God and glorify His name. We have an AAL Insurance Branch. Each summer we have a "Summer Sign Language Class" in order to reach out to the Hearing community.

Emmanuel has had 5 previous pastors. Rev. William "Bud" Palmer is the sixth pastor. He has been privileged to have served at Emmanuel since 1984. Pastor Palmer also travels one preaching station. He ministers to 2 Deaf Lutherans in Sheboygan. He also ministers to another group of about 15 deaf Lutherans in the Menasha/Oshkosh area. Together Emmanuel has 130 communicant members along with 198 baptized members.

Pray that God will continue to bless the wonderful ministry of Emmanuel, Pastor Palmer and their 100th anniversary next year.

Believing What We Cannot Understand!



An unbeliever once said, "I will believe only what I can understand; none of that 'mystery stuff' for me." Well, life has many mysteries; see if you can explain these: (Doesn't this sound a bit like 'doubting Thomas?" (ed.) First of all, consider the transformation that takes place in a caterpillar, whom a smart aleck has described as "an upholstered worm." The caterpillar covers itself in a homemade casket and is changed into a beautiful butterfly. Its hair is changed to scales, a million to the square inch. The many legs of the caterpillar become six legs of the butterfly. The yellow becomes a beautiful red. The crawling insect becomes a soaring masterpiece. Can you explain this mystery? I can't. Neither can any scientist or naturalist. Its a mystery we have to accept.

Secondly, consider the mystery of sugar. It is composed of hydrogen and oxygen, both of them odorless. They are combined with carbon which is insoluble (cannot be dissolved). The result of this strange combination is beautiful, white, sweet

sugar. Explain it? I can't. Neither can you!

Thirdly, think about how the limb (branch) of a tree grows straight out from the trunk for forty, fifty or sixty feet, with no other anchorage than fifteen or eighteen inches of fibres which lose themselves in the trunk of the tree. No man has discovered how to apply this principle in the construction of buildings or bridges. Try to explain this mystery?

Fourthly, speaking of unusual structures, consider an elephant. Its four legs bend forward in the same direction. No other animal that has four feet is so made. It has too large a body to live on two legs. For this reason it was given four fulcrums (props) so that it could rise from the ground easily. The horse rises from the ground on its two front legs first. The cow rises on its two hind legs first. But the elephant uses all four legs at the same time. Explain it? Yet it is true!




What does Christmas mean to you?

All through the day I had not time, To speak a word of Christ to friends, They'd laugh at me If eared.


No time, no time, too much to do. That was my constant cry, No time to give to those in need. At last t'was time to die.
